If you're a current Dal student and identify as African Nova Scotian, please submit a maximum 1 page letter, or 1 to 2 minute video outlining:

- » Your program, year of study and projected graduation date.
- Why you want to join the Advisory Council, and what skills and/or experience you will bring to the group.
- Which of the 52 land-based African Nova Scotian communities that you are connected to via lineage, and briefly describe that connection. If you are unable to name a particular community, please explain why.
- » Apart from lineage, please indicate the other ways that you connect and engage with African Nova Scotian people or communities.
